It offers credit courses in more than forty fields and special non-credit programs of liberal and professional education. Among the latter are the Basic Program of Liberal Education for Adults, the Fine Arts Program, the Center for Programs in the Mass Media, the Center for Programs in Government Administration, the Office of Special Services to Business and Industry, and a series of Special Courses, including seminars, workshops, and tours. All these programs are described in detail in the new 1959-60 Annual Prospectus catalogue, which is available on request from the Downtown Center, 64 East Lake Street, Financial 6-8300.

THE WOMAN'S COLLEGE BOARD of Chicago, established in 1933, is a non-profit organization serving twenty-eight liberal arts colleges and their local alumnae. It is a co-sponsor of the "Know Your Chicago" series, an associate member of the Chicago Educational Television Association, and a sponsor of radio programs by member colleges. Other services include free college counseling for high-school girls and publication of an Alumnae Club Guide and a Handbook of Information about member colleges.
